At the 10:45am service this morning we are pleased and privileged to welcome Clifton Kirkpatrick as our Hudnut Preacher. Cliff Kirkpatrick is Visiting Professor of Ecumenical Studies and Global Ministries at Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary. He previously served as Stated Clerk of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). He has been a leader in the global ecumenical movement.

Portions of the liturgy this morning are adapted from the Confession of Belhar, a theological affirmation from the 1980s, apartheid era South African church. The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is in the process of considering adding the Belhar Confession to its Book of Confessions, which is the occasion for Cliff's visit to Rochester. On Friday and Saturday he led workshops for members of the presbytery, and he has been a leader in the effort to help us think about this important theological witness.

Third Church is grateful for his leadership in this and many arenas, and we are grateful for his presence with us. As our Hudnut Preacher, his visit is supported by gifts made in memory of William H. Hudnut, Jr. Pastor of Third Church from 1946-1964.
