

The Memorial Prayer Candle is lit today at the beginning of the school year for students, teachers, administrators and families with prayers for a great school year.

Notes about today's music:

The **prelude**, "Fanfare," by British composer Percy Whitlock, is a piece dating from 1932, which is rich in rhythmic vitality, and harmonic shifts. Whitlock was a student of C. V. Stanford and Ralph Vaughan Williams. The **music for reflection**, "A Song Without Words," was written by Craig Phillips, an alum of the Eastman School of Music, and now Director of Music and Organist at All Saints' Church (Episcopal) in Beverly Hills, California. It was written as an elegy for his brother, and expresses what William Wordsworth called "thoughts that do often lie too deep for tears." This morning it speaks to us as we reflect on the fifteenth anniversary of the events of September 11, 2001.

Jehan Alain, composer of today's **postlude**, "Litanies," was a casualty of World War II, killed in action at the age of 29. It was written in 1937, originally contrasting some comic elements with a tragic undercurrent that eventually prevails. The insistent, even obsessive, rhythm of the theme calls to mind the repetition of a fervent prayer. Several weeks after its composition, the composer's older sister died in a climbing accident, after which he added the inscription printed in the bulletin.
