
PRAYER of CONFESSION

ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Olivier Messiaen (1908 – 1992) was one of the foremost French organist-composers of the 20th century. He was also a devout Roman Catholic, whose religious expression through his compositions places him as perhaps one of the most “spiritual” of composers since J. S. Bach. The “Alléluias sereins,” heard in the prelude today, comes from his four-movement suite, “L’Ascension,” dating from 1933. It was originally composed for orchestra, and he later transcribed it for organ. This movement pictures the ecstatic vision of a soul longing for heaven – with variations on a melody supported by exotic harmonies, and even the hint of fluttering angel wings. It leaves us suspended in the liminal space between earth and heaven.

Composer Lee Hoiby (1925 – 2011) was known primarily for his operas and art songs, but he also left a wonderful body of choral music, much of which was written earlier in his career. Text was of utmost importance to him in his composition, and he set several wonderful texts by 16th century poet John Donne. His anthem “At the Round Earth’s Imagined Corners” is among these, and serves as our first anthem this morning. What follows is an examination of Donne and the text, written by former Third Church tenor soloist John Denison, who also taught English Literature...the full text of the sonnet appears in the Order of Worship.

A leader of the Late Renaissance group of poets known as “metaphysical poets,” John Donne (1572-1631) converted to Anglicanism at age 21, after having been raised a devout Roman Catholic. He took holy orders in 1615 and became Dean of London’s St. Paul’s Cathedral six years later. His sermons were acclaimed for their literary and dramatic intensity and his “Meditation 17” (“No man is an island...”) is one of the most frequently-quoted works in the literature.

Donne struggled with guilt and a sense of unworthiness throughout his life. His Holy Sonnets chronicle the agonizing trials of an intellectual in search of faith, and the demand that pervades the sonnets is for God to become a dynamic force in Donne’s life to the exclusion of all else.

In the first eight lines of Holy Sonnet 7 (“At the round earth’s imagined corners”) Donne calls upon the angels to announce the Last Judgment and for the souls of the dead to arise and “to your scattered bodies go,” an exhortation born of his despair and desire to get his own judgment over with. The final six lines witness an abrupt, dramatic reversal, however, as Donne seems terrified by the sudden realization that his sins are greater than those of the “numberless infinities of souls” who have preceded him and the guilt that he has not prepared himself for that certainty. He implores God, therefore, to defer Judgment Day and to teach him how to repent: “...for that’s as good / As if Thou hadst sealed my pardon with Thy blood.” This concluding couplet clearly signifies Donne’s intense spiritual struggle, because for the truly faithful, of course, that has already occurred; God has sealed our pardon with His blood – the blood of Jesus Christ.

The anthem “Blow Ye the Trumpet,” is by Kirke Mechem (born 1925). It comes from his opera *John Brown*. This was the title of John Brown’s favorite hymn, and it has the flavor of an early American folk tune, though it is an original melody by Mechem. The text Mechem found to form the basis of this anthem seems appropriate, and prophetic, for Brown’s life and death, which moved forward the abolitionist’s cause, through a martyr’s death.
