
PRAYER of CONFESSION







ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

The prelude and postlude this morning each come from one of the major collections of preludes on hymn tunes composed by J. S. Bach (1685 – 1750). The prelude, "Allein Gott in der Höh," comes from a collection known as the Leipzig Chorales, which were collected and reworked in the last ten years of his life from pieces he had composed earlier in his career. It is a setting of a hymn version by Martin Luther and Nikolaus Decius of the liturgical "Glory to God in the highest." The gentle accompaniment introduces each phrase by outlining portions of the tune, which appears, in a highly ornamented fashion in the top voice. The postlude, "Wir glauben all an einen Gott," is based on a hymn setting of the creed as written by Martin Luther. This chorale prelude comes from the Clavierübung III ("keyboard practice"), one of only a small number of compositions or collections published during Bach's lifetime.

Lee Hoiby (1926 – 2011) was a leading American composer of the 20th century, best known for his operas and arts songs. But he also composed a solid body of sacred music, including this morning's first anthem, based on familiar words from Philippians. The entire piece is pervaded by a musical motive derived from the rhythm of the words "let this mind be in you."

The offertory anthem is a modern (1970s) setting of a powerful poem by William Blake (1757 – 1827) that speaks eloquently even today of our need for empathy for all of God's creatures. Composer Jane Marshall (b. 1924) has been active throughout her career as a church musician and member of the theory and sacred music faculties at Southern Methodist University in Dallas. She has traveled widely as a choral clinician as well.

The communion motet is a simple, yet musically rich, piece by 20th century French composer and organist, Maurice Duruflé (1902 – 1986). In it, he sets a portion of an ancient liturgical text for Maundy Thursday, "Ubi caritas et amor," with its original Gregorian chant melody, but clothes it in the rich harmonic language of post-Impressionist 20th century French music.
